GOOD NEWS!



Aided by an Impact Grant received from the Warren County Foundation, Adult New Readers formed a partnership with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to seek out and help parents who may need to skill up in order to read the free books their children receive from the library.

WCCS moved their main offices to 645 Oak Street in Lebanon. The Administrative Offices, Fiscal, Elderly Services Program, Adult New Readers, Growth Together Employment Program, RSVP Volunteer Program, and Imagination Library are now housed at this location.

The Growth Together Employment **Program** formed a partnership with United Way of Warren County High School Workforce Initiative focusing on helping young adults who turn 18 choose a career path and locate training opportunities for that profession.

The Emergency Services Department was created to provide households with utility assistance, rental arrears, and various other assistance. This includes the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (E-RAP) for households experiencing financial hardship due directly or indirectly to the COVID-19 outbreak.
